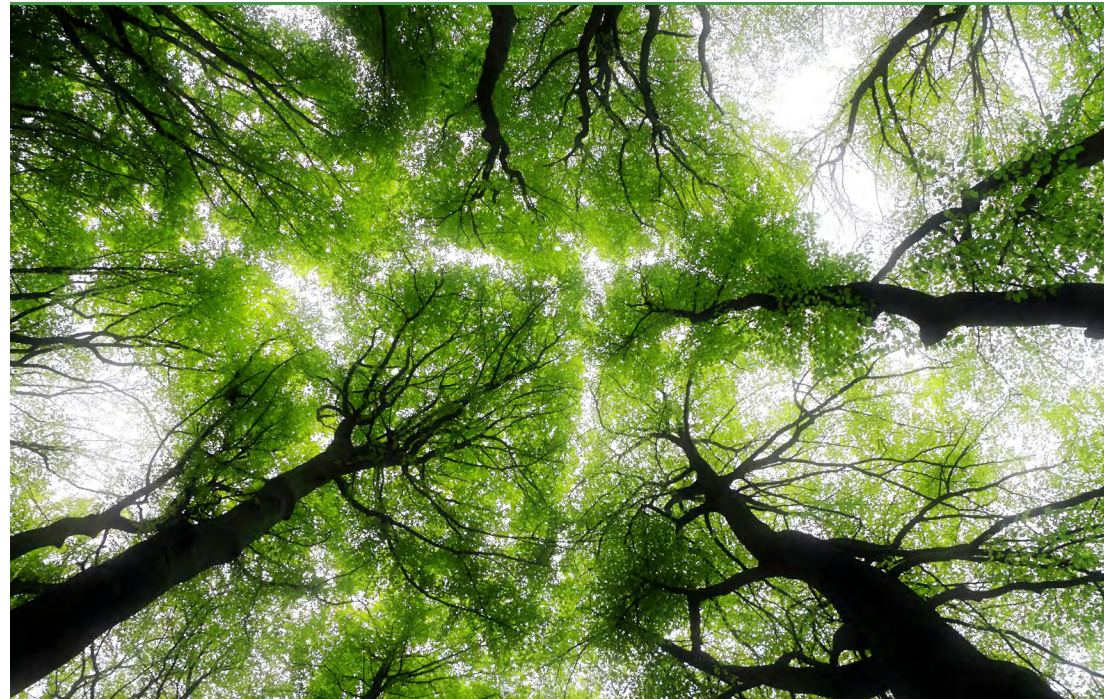

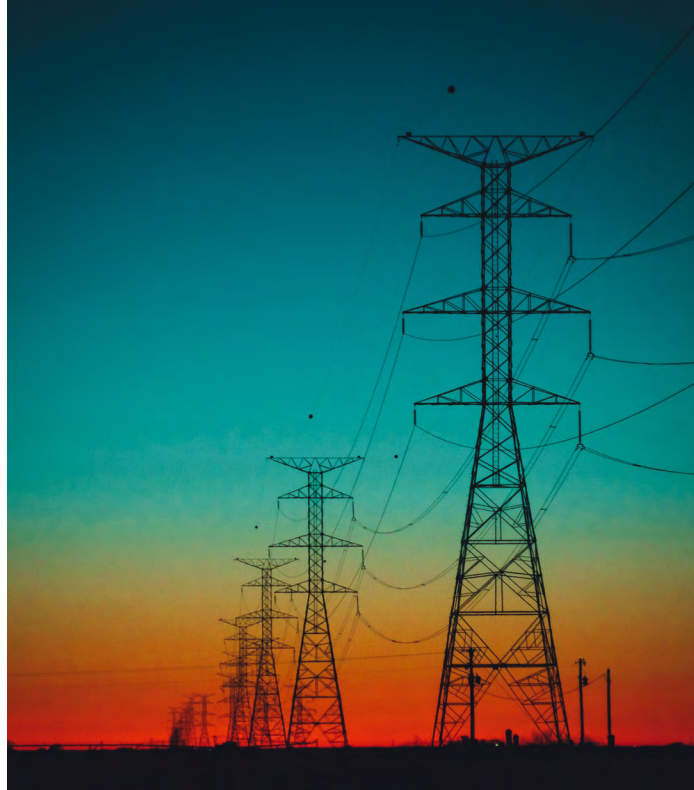

### Navigating the Great Unraveling

During the 20th century, humanity’s increasing adoption of fossil fuels as sources of cheap and abundant energy enabled rapid industrialization. The result was a massive increase in nearly all human activities and their ecological and social impacts, a process that has been called the Great Acceleration. Now, in the 2020s, the Great Acceleration is losing steam and shows signs of reversing direction. Thought leaders and policy think tanks have invented a new word—polycrisis—to refer to the tangles of global environmental and social dilemmas that are accumulating, mutually interacting, and worsening.

Humanity is now entering what some have called the Great Unraveling—a time of consequences in which individual impacts are compounding to threaten the very environmental and social systems that support modern human civilization. The Great Unraveling challenges us to grapple with the prospect of a far more difficult future, one of mutually exacerbating crises—some acute, others chronic—interacting across environmental and social systems in complex ways, at different rates, in many places, and with different results.



### Community Resilience

Post Carbon Institute believes that building community resilience is our best response to the looming economic, energy, and environmental challenges of the 21st century. A resilient community is one that can maintain its essential identity while adapting to these and other challenges.

We can build a more resilient, equitable, and sustainable world for all—if we have a true understanding of the nature of the challenges, employ systems and resilience thinking, and act with courage, creativity, humility, and humanity. Post Carbon Institute’s work supports people who want to deepen their thinking and pursue strategies that build community resilience in a sustainable and equitable way.

### The Energy Transition

We face a transformational moment in humanity’s energy story. We can no longer ignore the ever-rising financial, social, and environmental costs of fossil fuels; nor can we ignore questions about what a truly renewable energy future will look like.

Post Carbon Institute believes that in order to make the right choices and investments, we must have a more comprehensive understanding of our energy predicament and options. Our work builds this fundamental energy literacy and aims to shift the public conversation around energy—from wanting more to needing less, and valuing what we have.

### Limits to Growth

In 1972, the bestselling environmental book of all time—*The Limits to Growth*—presented the results of a computer simulation that looked at trends in global population, resource consumption, economic activity, and pollution. The study found that the economy and human population were unlikely to grow beyond the end of 21st century, and might contract well before then. And despite aggressive attacks from some corners and the general ignorance/denial of policymakers and the public, we do appear to be tracking the standard-run scenario of *The Limits to Growth*.

Post Carbon Institute believes that the sustainability challenges humanity faces are interrelated facets of one essential truth: the planet can not support ever-more economic growth and resource consumption. Our work helps people connect the dots and understand the alternatives to growth at any cost.

Our popular news site, Resilience.org, aims to support building community resilience in a world of multiple emerging challenges: the decline of cheap energy, the depletion of critical resources like water, complex environmental crises like climate change and biodiversity loss, and the social and economic issues which are linked to these. We like to think of the site as a community library with space to read and think, but also as a vibrant café in which to meet people, discuss ideas and projects, and pick up and share tips on how to build the resilience of your community, your household, or yourself.

### Think Resilience: Online Course

- 11,000+ people enrolled from all over the world
- 1,400+ people have taken the course in discussion groups
- 1,000+ students have used the course videos as part of a college or high school course
- Video subtitles translated into Spanish, French, Italian, and German
- Over \$20,000 (USD) raised to help keep the course free for everyone

Think Resilience is an online course to help you start doing something about climate change and our other sustainability challenges—starting in your own community. It features twenty-two short video lectures by Post Carbon Institute Senior Fellow Richard Heinberg, one of the world's foremost experts on the urgency of transitioning society away from fossil fuels.

### Liminality Network

The Liminality Network is a diverse, global community of practitioners, thinkers, and influencers navigating the unraveling of human and natural systems and positively contributing to emerging realities.

The Liminality Network strives to ensure diversity and a balance of global perspectives. It aims to balance the focus of events, dialogues, online discussions, and working groups between deepening members' analysis and understanding of the crisis and opportunities we face; helping members feel agency over the Great Unraveling; and supporting members to develop interventions and sustainable alternatives to nurture the best possible future.

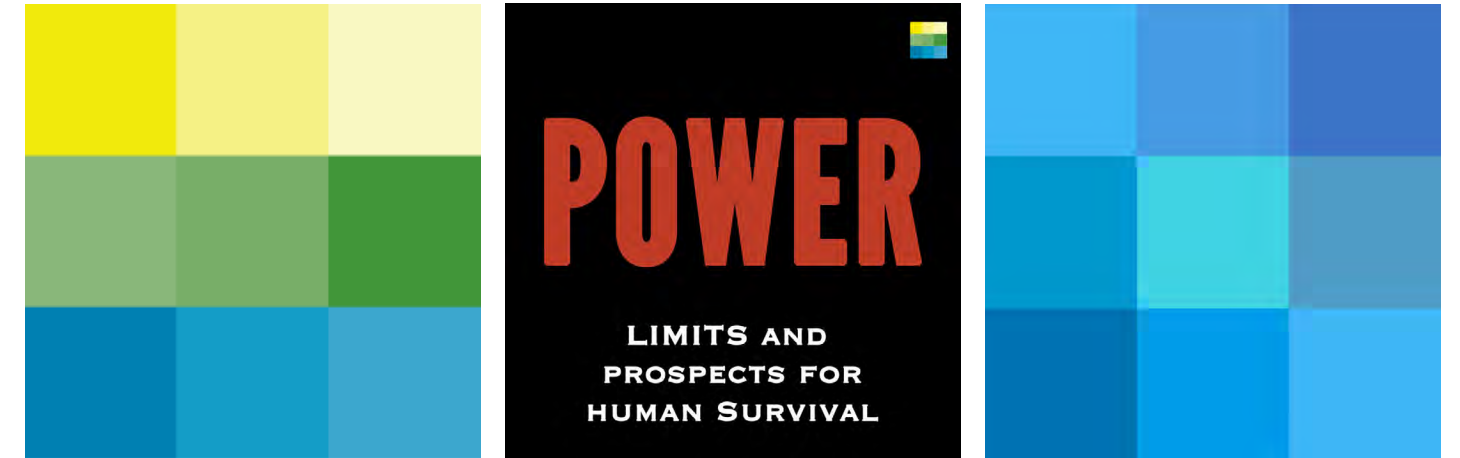

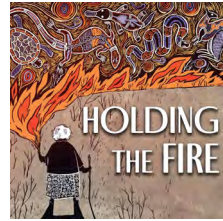

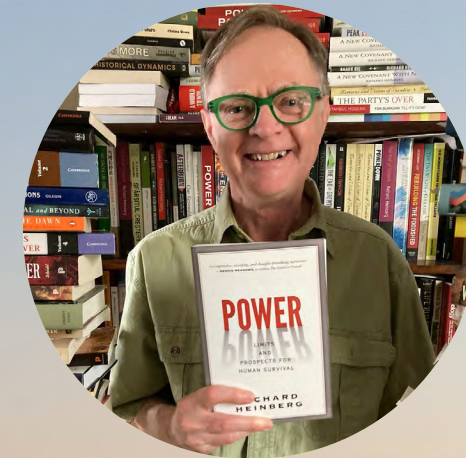

Richard Heinberg has written a regular column for the Ecologist magazine and has authored scores of essays and articles that have appeared in: Nature, Wall Street Journal, Reuters, Christian Science Monitor, The American Prospect, Public Policy Research, Quarterly Review, Boston Review, Z Magazine, Resurgence, The Futurist, European Business Review, Earth Island Journal, Yes!, Pacific Ecologist, Wild Matters, The Proceedings of the Canadian Association of the Club of Rome, Canadian Dimension, Alternative Press Review, and The Sun; and on Altnet.org, CommonDreams.org, Resilience.org, ProjectCensored.com, and Counterpunch.com websites.

Richard has appeared in several documentary films including: Once You Know (2022), 11th Hour (produced and narrated by Leonardo diCaprio, 2007); The History Channel’s Megadisasters series, episode “Oil Apocalypse” (2007); Escape from Suburbia (2007); What a Way to Go: Life at the End of Empire (2007); Crude Impact (2006); Oil, Smoke & Mirrors (2006); the nationally televised PBS documentary Ripe for Change (2006); The Power of Community: How Cuba Survived Peak Oil (2006); Blind Spot (2008); and The End of Suburbia (2004).



Richard has appeared on national television and/or radio in eight countries. His U.S. media appearances include Good Morning America (ABC) and NPR’s Morning Edition, and he has been interviewed by Michael Toms (New Dimensions Radio), Art Bell and George Noori (Coast to Coast AM), Thom Hartmann (Air America and RT), and John Batchelor (WABC), among many others. He has been quoted in Time magazine (October 31, 2005), and his work has been discussed in Harper’s (August, 2006) and in syndicated articles by Reuters and Associated Press. An extensive interview with him appeared in the August 2006 issue of The Sun magazine.

The September 18, 2006 issue of The New Yorker noted that Heinberg’s book *The Party’s Over* was on Bill Clinton’s summer reading list; according to Clinton interviewer David Remnick, the former President’s copy “was full of underlinings and what looked like the most serious undergraduate’s markings, with lots of exclamation points.”

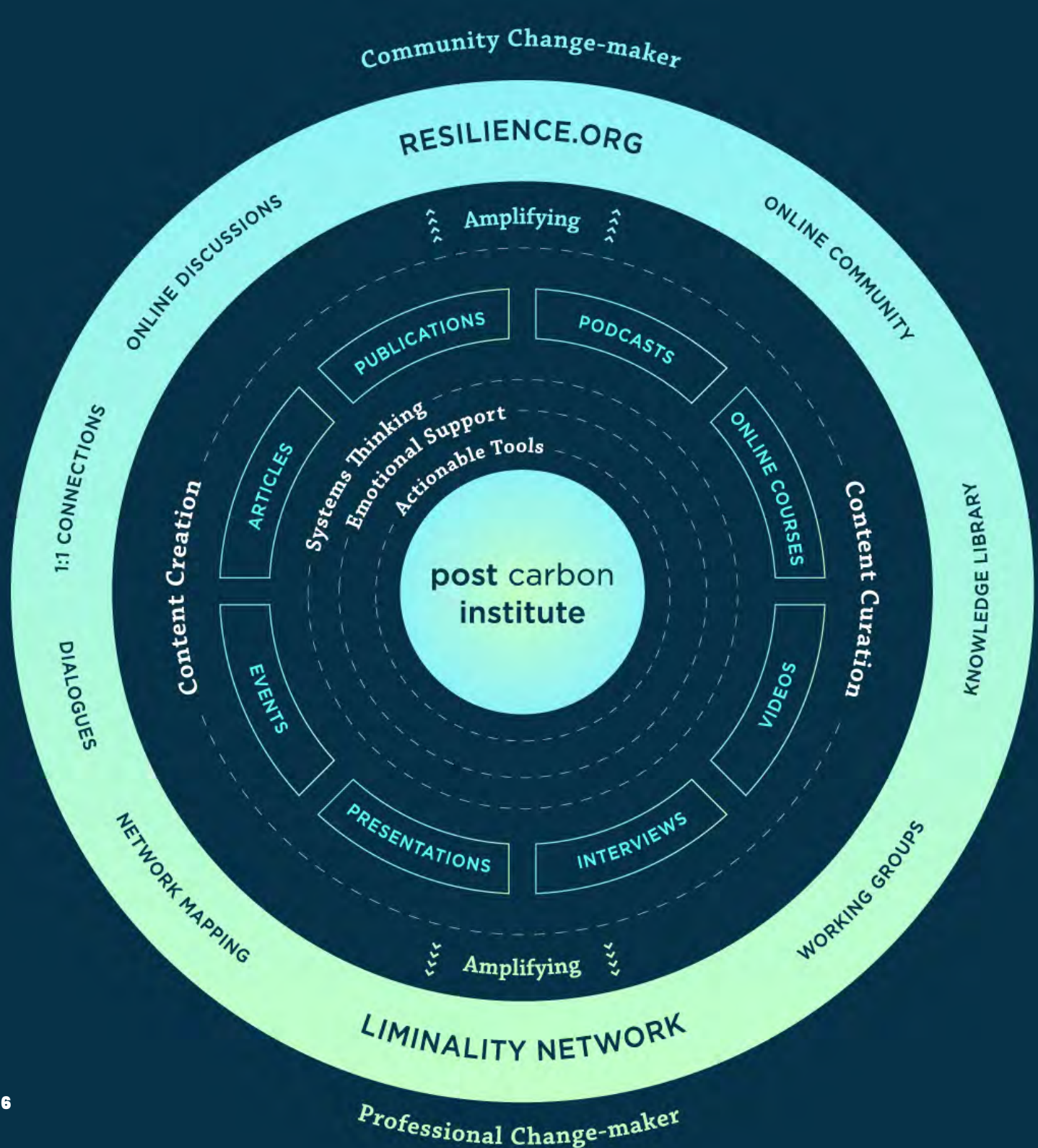

### The Next 20 Years

For the last 20 years, Post Carbon Institute has warned that the costs of exponential growth of population and consumption, and the exploitation of both people and planet, would soon come due. The days of warning are now over. The days of reckoning are here.

Over the coming months, years, and decades, our primary challenge — individually and collectively — will be to navigate the “Great Unraveling” of current environmental and social systems in ways that ensure the most collective wellbeing, while putting humanity on a path of resilience, justice, and sustainability.

The nature of so many complex, dynamic systems in crisis makes it impossible to predict how the next few years, let alone the next 20, will unfold. Although some collapse is inevitable, a terrible long-term outcome is not. While those in positions of power will do their best to uphold the status quo — inviting even greater suffering and impacts — times of crisis are also times of opportunity, when radical alternatives can surface and gain widespread acceptance. These alternatives can put us on a collective path towards kinship and balance with one another and the more-than-human world, or they can catalyze the worst,

most regressive behaviors.

Over the coming years, Post Carbon Institute will dedicate itself to championing and supporting the most positive alternatives to the status quo by providing our growing community with the informational, emotional, and practical resources they need to personally navigate the Great Unraveling and serve as pathfinders in their own communities.

There are no guaranteed outcomes, nor do we know the future of our own humble organization. But with the commitment and support of our community of learners, doers, and donors we feel certain that PCI’s impact will be felt over the next 20 years and beyond.
